RSPB LAKENHEATH FEN

Now that Spring is here, much of our wildlife becomes active again- small birds are singing, butterflies are beginning to emerge and birds of prey are courting and nest-building. This provides the reserve team with a great opportunity to survey what we have living here to (hopefully) get a good idea of the numbers of different species using the reserve.

Already underway are Breeding Bird Survey-style counts of small birds. The reserve is divided up into areas and the staff team each have their own 'patch' which they visit at least three times in the Spring to count the numbers of small birds such as Great spotted woodpecker, Wren or Reed warbler. Our administrator Suzanne will survey Brandon Fen, whilst I do Trial Wood, and our Site Manager Dave will do land on Cowles Drove. We take a map with us and mark what we see- which helps us on return visits to get an idea of territories, and thereby numbers.

Later in March we will begin our early morning Bittern and Marsh harrier surveys- these are done as a co-ordinated team, with several of our volunteers involved too. We start at 5am because this is when male Bitterns do the most booming- giving off their incredibly loud, deep bellows which travel a very long way across the reedbeds. Males and females are also most active at this time so we can get the best idea of where territories and- later- nests will be. We will also record displaying male Marsh harriers, and where we see both sexes delivering nesting material or food. In 2024 we had a record 17 booming male Bitterns, followed by at least 7 nests. Because female Bitterns do all of the nest-building, incubating and raising of chicks, these two figures can be wildly different. We also know we had a minimum of 15 Marsh harrier fledglings from at least 12 nests. In a few months' time we will be able to report on how these two wetland specialists have fared in 2025.

It's not just the birds that get counted though, as three of our volunteers very kindly commit themselves to weekly surveys between April and September of our butterflies. They walk the same route each week and at the end of the season we send in their data to Butterfly Conservation. We also have our daily sightings list in the Visitor Centre- and anything goes on here, from tiny ladybirds right up to the huge Great white egrets that can be found on the nearby Hockwold Washes. Another of our volunteers submits this data electronically to Merlin, the RSPB's recording scheme, so it gets counted officially.

As well as our own records we love to record what our visitors have spotted, and their sightings are vital for getting a picture of what is happening on the reserve with our wildlife. So, next time you come to see us- we would love to know what you saw on your visit- whether it is common or rare, all wildlife is important and every record counts.

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The 48th Fighter Wing provides worldwide responsive combat airpower and support.

The 48th Fighter Wing – also known as the Liberty Wing - is located at RAF Lakenheath and RAF Feltwell. Consisting of more than 5,000 U.S. military members, over 1,500 British and U.S. civilians, and around 8,500 dependents, it is the largest U.S.-operated Air Force base in the United Kingdom and home to both F-15E and F-35A fighter jets. Current priorities for the 48th Fighter Wing include doubling our F-35A fleet by 2024 and providing balance for our people.





Historically, the 48th FW has been the foundation of USAFE's combat capability and remains so today. The Liberty Wing led the El Dorado Canyon raids into Libya in 1986 and was the first F-111 fighter unit to seploy to the Gulf during Operations Desert Shield and esert Storm. The Liberty Wing also nchored NATO forces during tions Deliberate Force and ed Force. Since September 11 2001, the 48th FW has played a key de in antiterrorism operatio lying combat missions, and oviding combat support in perations Enduring Freedom and pai Freedom

The children made a display using these fish, combining them all together to make one larger fish; it shows the progression of skills from EYFS to Year 6.







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
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<u>WEST ROW</u> BOWLS CLUB NEWS

AROUND THE ALLOTMENTS IN APRIL & MAY



As the days lengthen and temperatures rise, April and May are some of the most rewarding months for allotment gardeners. Nature is bursting into life, and there's plenty to do to prepare for a productive growing season.

April is a busy month which sees longer days and hopefully some nice warm sunshine, but it's important not to forget that there is always the threat of overnight frosts, so it pays be cautious when planting out young plants or seedlings. The setting of seed potatoes should be completed by the end of April but again, if frosts are forecast, it's a good idea to protect shoots that have emerged from any early varieties already set. Covering outside plants, such as strawberries, with fleece helps to protect from birds and other pests and fleece can also be used in the greenhouse at this time of year where frosts can still affect young plants.

April is also a good time to check fruit bushes for early signs of aphids which can be treated with a soapy water spray: more information can be found at

https://realenglishfruit.co.uk/aphids

along with advice about many other pests and diseases which can affect fruit crops

(https://realenglishfruit.co.uk/fruit-tree-pests-and-diseases).

May can often be unpredictable weather wise. Keep a close watch out for late frosts. May is also a busy and exciting month for allotment gardening, as plants are growing quickly, and there's plenty to sow, plant and harvest. During May you can start to sow carrots, beetroot, radishes and lettuce to name a few. You can earth up you early and maincrop potatoes as the shoots grow to protect them from frost and encourage tuber production. This time of year, protect your strawberries with netting, remove runners and mulch with straw to keep fruit clean. Stay on top of the weeds as they can grow rapidly in the warmer weather. Keep a close eye out for early pest damage, especially slugs and snails.

May is full of potential for your allotment, so enjoy the sunshine and the reward of nurturing your crops!

This year, St. Peter's has been using a course called Hope Explored. Which does exactly what is says on the tin – it's a course designed to help people think a little bit about the Christian faith, and whether it can give us hope.

As I was leading the sessions, and watching the videos, it reminded me of my own journey to faith, nearly forty years ago.

At the time, I was an atheist, studying Business Studies at University. One part of the course was Psychology, and we had been looking at a concept called Cognitive Dissonance. That's where there is a conflict between our beliefs and our actions. We find this difference, this gap, difficult – it causes unease or discomfort - and so we try to bring them together.

And what happens is that our beliefs often change to reflect our actions, or we try to wish away the difference between them.

But as I studied the accounts of the first Easter, I was struck how the first disciples resolved their own cognitive dissonance.

Before Easter, the disciples did not believe Jesus was going to be crucified and then raised again – so they often argued with Jesus, criticised or took him to one side to tell him he was wrong whenever he spoke about this. They knew what they believed, and it didn't look like that. Peter even took this disagreement so far that he denied Jesus. Judas took it even further and betrayed him.

Yet after Easter day, they were totally different. They started to talk about Jesus being raised from the dead. Indeed, of the eleven who remained followers of Jesus post Easter, ten of them would die rather than deny Jesus' resurrection. Their actions now reflected a belief that Jesus was right all along, that he had really died and risen again.

And it struck me that there was a huge gap between the before and after, despite it only being a matter of hours. There was a pivot point. The pivot point was what changed them. What made the difference?

And the only thing that made sense then, and the only thing that makes sense to me forty years later, is that on Easter Day they actually met with a dead man risen. They met with Jesus and that made all the difference.

Having come to that kind of conclusion, it really was quite a simple step, a small step for me myself to say to Jesus "Okay then, you must be alive, and I must follow you." What else could I do?

A small boy was consistently late coming home from school. His parents warned him that he must be home on time that afternoon, but nevertheless he arrived later than ever. His mother met him at the door and said nothing. His Father met him in the living room and said nothing.

At dinner that night, the boy looked at his plate. There was a slice of bread and a glass of water. He looked at his father's full plate and then at his father, but his father remained silent. The boy was crushed.

The father waited for the full impact to sink in, then quietly took the boy's plate and placed it in front of himself. He took his own plate of meat and potatoes, put it in front of the boy, and smiled at his son.

When that boy grew to be a man, he said, "All my life I've known what God is like by what my father did that night."

Easter is a time that reminds us of what God is like too. In the Bible we read "*God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life*." God, in His Son has done for us what we could not do for ourselves. Just as the father in the illustration took his son's terrible dinner for himself and gave his son his wonderful meal, so Jesus, on the cross, took the punishment of God that was due to sinners like us upon Himself and credited the believing sinner with His righteousness.

Because Jesus was willing to incur the full fury of God's wrath for our wrongdoing, we can become citizens of heaven. There is nothing else in all the world that demonstrates how real God's love is for sinners and how real our sin is to God.

We can do nothing to earn our forgiveness. In and of ourselves we can never please God but if we trust in Jesus to make us right with God and if we repent of our sin then God promises in the Bible in 1 John 1:9, "*If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness*."

What wonderful news this is and don't we need good news in the world at the moment? Please consider what God has done for sinners in the Lord Jesus, confess your sin and trust in Him to make you right with God.

May you all have a blessed Easter as you consider what it is all really about.

MILDENHALL MECHANISED FARMING CLUB

Mildenhall Mechanised Farming Club was formed in 1945. They are celebrating their 80th season

At their recent meeting their guest speaker was Paul Dunham (Trustee of Prickwillow Museum) he spoke about how the Fens have developed and the impact this has had on our locality. The local history of Farming and Agriculture. Various Members shared their memories of the Club through the Decades. Club President, Frank Wright, formally of County Farm, West Row Fen. he shared his early memories of the Club. Frank has been a member since the late Forties, when he attended as a youngster with his father.

Members were presented with a commemorative pen and whiskey glass; this was designed and produced by Personal Images Ltd, Mildenhall.

Mark Garrard, Club Secretary has coordinated meetings, events and visits for the club for over forty years said It was great to see so many people attending and sharing their memories of Farming and Machinery over the years"

Where it all began......

MMFC began in the mid 1940s. Founded in West Row, it was originally named 'The West Row Agricultural Club. The early meetings were held in West Row Village Hall. Bert Edwards and Newman Ford (Jessie Ford's Father) along with George Root and Johnathan Brown became some of the first committee members. A few years later, the meetings were held in The Pear Tree pub in West Row.

In 1946, a village show was held in the field at the back of West Row School. The aim was to raise money for the Homecoming Fund (this was for the soldiers coming back from the war). A ploughing match was organised by the club. Fred Jarman(relative of Brian Jarman) came second in the ploughing match. After the War, the membership dropped for a few years but then revived when the the Ministry of Ag. provided speakers for a lot of the meetings in the early days they wanted to encourage the farmers to grow more food. Also the machinery manufacturers brought out a lot of new machines, so after the war they were keen to encourage interest by providing speakers to advertise their new products.

In the Early 50's, the Club moved to Mildenhall and the meetings were held in Riverside School and the committee meetings took place in the Queen's Arms Pub. Key people included Spencer Parker (Chairman) and Billy Webb. Alan Shaw was the Machinery Officer for M.A.F.F. the Treasurer was Mr. Moore (Bank Manager, Lloyds) and Malcom Jenkins (A.D.A.S) were on the committee In the late fifties, the Club then moved to the Maids Head Pub in Mildenhall.

In the sixties, the Club was called The Mildenhall Branch of the Suffolk Machinery Club, the Suffolk Machinery Club in Bury was closed down. At this time, we decided to become an independent Club and our name was changed to "The Mildenhall Mechanised Farming Club. There was a competition to design a logo for the club which is the one still being used today. During the seventies a range of social activities began including the 'Harvest Horkey' and the 'Annual Dinner and Dance' these continued well into the nineties.

Over the years the Club has welcomed a wide range of speakers from the Agricultural Industry, related business and charities. Some of these have often been followed up by summer visits and tours with meals out, these have been much enjoyed by members and their partners,

In the new Millennium Ladies were also invited to attend the meetings.

Over the years meetings have moved to various venues from the Maids Head to the Bell Hotel for a larger meeting room, then to the Riverside Hotel into the new Millennium. Until recently we resided for several years at the Worlington Hall Hotel before returning back to the Riverside Hotel. During the Covid19 pandemic, the club was not able to meet.



Events will be held in and around St. Peter's Church, Church Green, also the Village Hall, and the Indoor Bowls Club.



RECIPE CORNER

<u>Chocolate Easter Nest Cakes</u>

Ingredients

225g/8oz dark chocolate or a mix of dark and milk chocolate broken into pieces 2 tbsp golden syrup 50g/2oz butter 75g/2 3/4 oz cornflakes or puffed rice cereal 36 mini chocolate eggs

Method

1. Line a 12-hole fairy cake tin with paper cases.

2. Melt the chocolate, golden syrup and butter in a bowl set over a saucepan of gently simmering water (do not let the base of the bowl touch the water). Stir until the mixture is smooth.

3. Remove the bowl from the heat and gently stir in the cornflakes until all the cereal is coated in chocolate.

4. Divide the mixture between the paper cases and press chocolate eggs into the centre of east nest. Chill in fridge for 1 hour, or until completely set.
